varicose veins

Irregularly swollen or enlarged; affected with, containing, or pertaining to, varices or varicosities; as a varicose vein or ulcer.

varix

A permanent uneven or tortuous dilation of a vein (or, less commonly, an artery or lymph vessel); a varicose vein. Varices occur mostly in the superficial veins of the legs, esp. of pregnant women.

vermicide

Kills (or destroys) (intestinal) worms (ex. thymo1, pepo, GC1,).

vermifuge

Expels or aids in expulsion of worms, often by paralysis (ex. arecoline, scammony, castor oil, quassis, chenopodium, santonin, strong purgatives).

vesicant

Irritates skin sufficiently to cause watery blisters or vesicles to form (ex. capsicum, cantharis, mustard, stronger ammonia water, croton oil).

warts

Small tumors on the skin, usually hard, formed by enlargement of its papillae and thickening of the epidermis which covers them.

whooping cough

An infectious disease, usually of children, characterized by a violent convulsive cough, returning by fits, and consisting of several expirations, followed by a sonorous inspiration, or whoop.

yaws

Tumors characteristic of frambesia. Frambesia: a contagious disease of the skin, having many analogies with syphilis; called also pian.
